As we begin the Season of Lent, our friends at Creation Justice Ministries invite you to download the Creation Justice Ministries Lenten Calendar. This tool will guide you to deepen your Eco-spirituality throughout this holy time. Download the Lent Calendar HERE. Here are the beginning practices listed in the calendar for the first week of Lent:

March 13 The average person spends 87% of their time indoors, and another 6% of their time inside a vehicle. Consider adopting a new spiritual practice that makes you more attuned to God's creation. Find ideas at www.centerforspiritualityinnature.org/practices.

March 14 Carve out time for landscape or garden-planning. Cut back on or eliminate pesticide use this year. What role could native and pollinator-friendly plants play in your landscape? Write down one planned action you will take to honor God's creation with your landscape or garden plans in the spring. Not able to landscape? Check out community gardens and house plant opportunities.

March 15 Watch the "Story of Stuff" online video at www.storyofstuff.org.

An absolute, must-see!

March 16 Decide not to add any items to the landfill today. Use real cups, cloth napkins, reusable bags for groceries, and reusable water bottles.

March 17 If you don't already have one, consider ordering a copy of The Green Bible. All passages related to care and justice for God's creation are in green print. It is available online.

March 18 Are there "energy vampires" in your home which you can unplug to make a difference? Check www.smartenergy.com/energy-vampire for ideas. Then, try out a practice of observing the Sabbath by unplugging your electronics and yourself! Relish simple pleasures.

March 19 Take note of how your church's coffee hour is run. Look for opportunities to become more sustainable, such as eliminating Styrofoam, using china instead of paper cups, or buying from local vendors.

Gardening Activities

Native Milkweed for Monarchs: Individuals can help monarch butterflies and other pollinators in their own backyards by reducing the use of pesticides, volunteering in community habitat restoration, and by gardening for wildlife planting native milkweed and other nectar plants. Check out this blog on Twelve Native Milkweeds for Monarchs to learn more. Highlighted in the blog are 4 milkweeds native to Colorado, the Butterflyweed (Asclepias tuberosa), Swamp Milkweed (Asclepias incarnata), Antelope-horns Milkweed (Asclepias asperula), & Showy Milkweed (Asclepias speciosa).

Now is the perfect time to make your vard or garden space more attractive to birds, butterflies, and other local wildlife. All wildlife need four things to survive and thrive: natural sources of food, water, cover, and places to reproduce and raise their young. A prayer shared with us from the PDA:

Our spirits are heavy with sorrow, our souls shocked At the sudden and breathtaking violence, the invasion of Ukraine by their neighbor, Russia.

We pray for lives caught in the grip of war, who hear the bombs in the night, the ominous movement of troops on the road into town the whistle of incoming shells,

for a cry from a desperate neighbor or a shout of warning. For those who huddle in subways and basements or flee for the borders, clutching their children's hands We pray for families separated from fathers, brothers and sons who must remain to fight and protect their homeland.

We pray for neighbors in Eastern and Central Europe As their hearts and doors open to these refugees That strained resources will become an abundance of hope That fears and struggles with racism will yield to a generosity of profound welcome

That communities of faith within Ukraine will be protected from harm and sustained in their efforts to feed and shelter their neighbors. That peacemakers and protesters in Russia will be heard and their lives preserved.

May we undergird our prayers with tangible resources to help. May we reach deeply, give generously, and welcome extravagantly. May we lift our voices in a strong and unified advocacy. May we all, even as we breathe in lament, breathe out mercy, hope and peace.

And in this Lenten season, when we walk the way toward death and resurrection, repent our complicity in cultures of violence and renew our efforts toward justice and peace.

Want to support the people in Ukraine? Here's how you can help

Here is a non-exhaustive list of organizations that are asking for assistance. Donations can be made through the links to their websites or social media pages.

UNICEF

UNICEF supports health, nutrition, HIV prevention, education, safe drinking water, sanitation and protection for children and families caught in the conflict in Ukraine.

"Heavy weapons fire along the line of contact has already damaged critical water infrastructure and education facilities in recent days," said UNICEF Executive Director Catherine M. Russell in a statement.

Médecins Sans Frontieres/Doctors Without Borders

MSF runs a range of activities in Ukraine working with local volunteers, organizations, health care professionals and authorities to help people travel to health care facilities and access prescribed medications.

Voices of Children

The Ukrainian organization's Charitable Foundation helps provide psychological and psychosocial support to children affected by the armed conflict, according to its website.

Voices of Children's efforts of support for kids include art therapy, video storytelling, providing mobile psychologists and even individual help for families.

Sunflower of Peace

The nonprofit organization is raising money to prepare first aid medical tactical backpacks for paramedics and doctors on the front lines.

Each backpack is designed for groups of 5 to ten people and includes an array of first aid supplies — such as bandages, antihemorrhagic medicine and medical instruments, according to the organization's Facebook page.

International Committee of the Red Cross

This Switzerland-based organization is aiming to help people affected by the conflict and support the work of the Ukrainian Red Cross.

Save the Children

Save the Children, based in London, helps to deliver lifesaving aid to vulnerable children in Ukraine and around the world. According to its website, the organization says it is on the ground in the U.S. and other parts of the world "delivering essential humanitarian aid." "We are gravely concerned for children in Ukraine, Afghanistan and around the world who might be caught in the middle of armed conflict, forced to flee their homes and exposed to injury, hunger and sub-zero temperatures," the organization writes in a statement online.

UN Refugee Agency (UNHCR)

The international organization <u>aims to provide emergency</u> <u>assistance to families in Ukraine</u> — providing <u>aid such as cash</u> <u>assistance and opportunities</u> for resettlement in the U.S.

"UNHCR is working with the authorities, UN and other partners in Ukraine and is ready to provide humanitarian assistance wherever necessary and possible. To that effect, security and access for humanitarian efforts must be guaranteed," the organization said in a statement.

CARE

CARE is raising money for its Ukraine Crisis Fund, which will provide immediate aid including food, water, hygiene kits, support services and direct cash assistance.

The humanitarian organization aims to raise \$20 million and help at least 4 million Ukrainians. It says it will prioritize women and girls, families and the elderly.

International Medical Corps

The global nonprofit has been delivering primary health care and mental health services in eastern Ukraine since 2014, and is raising funds to expand those services for people affected by the latest conflict.

It says cold weather and economic insecurity in the leadup to Thursday's attack have left nearly 3 million Ukrainians relying on humanitarian assistance to meet their basic needs, a number that is certain to rise nationwide.

Its Ukraine team is preparing to deploy mobile medical teams to provide emergency and primary health services, mental health and psychosocial services and COVID-19 awareness and prevention services for people who have been displaced.
