Journey with Migrants Latest Advocacy Report

Human Rights Watch has posted reports of abuses by US Border Officials, which you can see HERE. The report includes key information along with guidance for addressing our government officials with our concerns.

This article from Time reports on the mental health challenges for immigrants, especially those whose status here is uncertain. It reports on the trauma of being an immigrant with all the uncertainty that must be borne and the various trials many have had to endure; here is the link.

The Center for Victims of Torture has a brief report from October 18 "Denouncing the Reinstatement of the Remain in Mexico Policy", which you can view here.

This week's Sojourners Monthly Conversation on Immigration included encouragement to continue to lobby Congress for action on a Path to Citizenship which has met an obstacle by not being considered proper to include in the Reconciliation Bill, this determined by the Senate's Parliamentarian, but it is hoped Congress may yet find a way for taking this critical step to alter our all too limited immigration policies. The email with this information is here. Their next zoom meeting is November 22 at 5:00 PM Mountain Time.

Mijente with others is hosting a webinar on November 9, 5:00 to 6:00 MT, to address the "Deadly Digital Wall", this regarding the varied forms of surveillance technology to be employed at our border. More information is found at their website, mijente.net.

The Interfaith Immigration Coalition is denouncing anti-black racism in our US immigration policies and actions. Their email report of October 22 provides details. The email also gives information for a "Together We Welcome Virtual Conference" for November 7 to 11, 4:00 to 7:00 MT. **Here's a link to the whole email**.

The last email update from the Latin America Working Group was sent October 22 and is full of information. Concerns continue to be raised about Title 42 expulsions that were started in the previous Administration and have been continued. One can sign up for their messages at lawg.org. This latest email addresses causes for immigration as well as our policies and how they are being implemented, critical information to understand better the challenge.

Bats Need You

Council Report: The Council approved fourth quarter Community contributions of \$250 to Teller Backpack Friends (a group that provides meals for students from low income families attending Teller Elementary School,, which is about a half mile east of the Church, to take home for the weekend and long school breaks) and \$500 to St. Francis Center (to help furbish the new Warren Residences).

SACK LUNCHES VOLUNTEERS NEEDED: Denver Catholic Worker Soup Kitchen (DCWSK) is looking for the services of volunteers to prepare and deliver 125 sack lunches to New Genesis Shelter and 100 sacks to Haven of Hope, one day a month, specifically the 3rd Friday of each month. DCWSK with the help of volunteers delivers up to 1200 lunch sacks to the homeless and the needy daily. Sack lunches include a sandwich (cheese and meat or PBJ) small bag of chips, a fruit, and a chewable granola bar. A maximum of 10 volunteers each preparing 25 sacks will be required to complete DCWSK's needs. All material costs will be reimbursed by DCWSK. Bat Week is an international, annual celebration designed to raise awareness about the need for bat conservation. Bats are amazing creatures that are vital to the health of our natural world and economy. Although we may not always see them, bats are hard at work all around the world each night - eating tons of insects, pollinating flowers, and spreading seeds that grow new plants and trees. In 2018, Bat Week International introduced the Celebrating Bats Cookbook that contained recipes inspired by bat-dependent foods. Now their Bat Week partners from South America, Central America and North America have added to that recipe collection: visit https://batweek.org/cookbook/ and click on the savory dishes or the sweet treats and drinks to learn how each contains ingredients that are bat pollinated, bat-protected or find out how bats disperse the seeds of the plants used each recipe.




